#### **IPM** statement

It is the goal of TRC's Early Childhood Programs to implement IPM by focusing on long-term prevention or suppression of pests through accurate pest identification, by frequent monitoring for pest presence, by applying appropriate action levels, and by making the habitat less conducive to pests using sanitation and mechanical and physical controls. Pesticides that are effective will be used in a manner that minimizes risks to people, property, and the environment, and only after other options have been shown ineffective.

Our pest management objectives are to: (Example: Focus on long-term pest prevention)

- > Comply with the Healthy Schools Act of 2000
- > Ensure the health and safety of participants and staff

# Pest identification, monitoring and inspection

Pest Identification is done by: Foothill Sierra Pest Control

(Example: College/University staff, Pest Control Business, etc.)

Monitoring and inspecting for pests and conditions that lead to pest problems are done regularly by Staff, Facilities Maint. Tech., Clark Pest Control and results are communicated to the IPM Coordinator.

(Example: Center staff title, e.g. Custodial staff)

Specific information about monitoring and inspecting for pests, such as locations, times, or techniques include: (Example: Sticky monitoring boards are placed in the kitchen and are checked weekly by custodial staff.)

- > Monthly treatment with EXEMPT pesticide for spiders on building exteriors.
- > Routine treatment for rodents/weeds/gophers on site-by-site basis.

## **Chemical pest management practices**

If non-chemical methods are ineffective, the child care center will consider pesticides only after careful monitoring indicates that they are needed according to pre-established action levels and will use pesticides that pose the least possible hazard and are effective in a manner that minimizes risks to people, property and the environment.

This child care center expects the following pesticides (pesticide products and active ingredients) to be applied during the year. (This list includes pesticides that will be applied by child care center staff or licensed pest control businesses.):

SPIDERS:

> Essentria IC3 Rosemary & Peppermint Oils; Geraniol

RODENTS:

- > Contrac Bait Blox; Bromadiolone
- > Ditrac Box: Diphacinone

HERBICIDE/WEEDS:

- > Esplanade 200SC; Indaziflam > Lifeline HV; Glufosinate Ammonium
- > Brandt Magnify; Ammonium Nitrate

## **Healthy Schools Act**

## **Submittal of pesticide use reports**

Reports of all pesticides applied by center staff during the calendar year, except pesticides exempt from HSA recordkeeping, are submitted to the Department of Pesticide Regulation at least annually, by January 30 of the following year, using the form provided at www.cdpr.ca.gov/schoolipm. (Education Code Section 16711)
